The Idaho Dept. of Fish and Game is celebrating its 125th anniversary in 2024. On May 9, 1899, the agency was established by the state legislature. Over the intervening years, Fish and Game has worked tirelessly to meet its mission to preserve, protect, perpetuate and manage Idaho's wildlife both now and into the future.

Beginning in 1938, public education became a part of the agency's work. The opening of the nature center in 1990 marked a significant step in providing high quality, wildlife-focused educational opportunities for the public. Today, the nature center continues to be a proud part of the agency's work, helping the public learn about and appreciate the state's wildlife resources and the work of the agency in managing those resources for all of us.

The spring forward into daylight savings time is the official signal that our busy field trip season is fast approaching. Natural signs of the changing season have also become evident--bird song, buds on trees and shrubs, and bees from the observation hive making forays outside on warm days.

Another sure sign of spring is the return of an AmeriCorps member to the nature center. We have been fortunate to host a member for the past eight years. The Friends of MK Nature Center, via generous donors, provides fiscal sponsorship for our member. We appreciate their continued support of this important opportunity. Providing formative experiences in environmental education and natural resources shines a light on another valuable role the nature center plays in our community.

Our new AmeriCorps member just started her term. We are excited to have her here and look forward to seeing where her nature center experience takes her in the future.



STUMPED

The stepping stumps and hollow log are an early project sponsored by the Friends of MK Nature Center (FOMKNC). They have been wildly popular since being installed. This fall, staff noticed that thousands of excited, jumping feet had taken their toll on the stumps. Master Naturalist and FOMKNC Board member Howard Sheppa began to look for replacement stumps. On a serendipitous whim, Howard contacted Idaho Tree Preservation just to see if they might be willing to sell some large rounds from trees they remove as part of their work. The answer was no, they wouldn't sell the rounds, instead they would donate them! Adding to that generosity, Idaho Tree Preservation staff delivered the wood rounds, free of charge.

The large, heavy new stumps were moved to their location and securely installed in late winter, thanks to the hard work of Howard and fellow Master Naturalists Todd Finato and Kevin Wilson. We are happy for more excited feet to enjoy jumping across the new stumps. Many thanks to Idaho Tree Preservation for their generosity!

Volunteer Spotlight







Art and Nature

Common Name: American Beaver Scientific Name: Castor Canadensis

Reproduction:

Mating is monogamous.

Breeding begins JAN-MAR. Gestation or pregnancy is roughly about four months.

Births typically occur APR-JUN. Average litter size is three-four offspring. Babies are called kits.

Female beavers have one litter a year, and kits are weaned by about six weeks old.

Life Cycle:

Young beavers will usually stay within a family group till they are about two years old. Can stay longer in healthy environments. Compared to other rodents, beavers become sexually mature later. Females mature at about 2-3 years old and males mature at about 1-2 years old.

Beavers live about 10-12 years in the wild and as long as 19 in captivity. They continue to grow their whole lives and can reach sizes of three-four feet long.

Anatomy Facts:

Largest rodent in North America.

Beavers' incisors (big front teeth) grow continuously throughout its life and are worn down and sharpened by daily use.

Have a membrane behind their teeth that allows them to carry sticks in their mouth without swallowing water.

Smaller front feet are dexterous and adapted for walking, grasping, and digging on land.

Larger hind feet are webbed and nearly hairless for swimming. They also have a special grooming toenail on the hind feet that is used like a comb to remove burs, parasites, and to keep fur clean.

Eyes have a second membrane called a nictitating membrane that protects their eyes while working underwater and swimming. Have inner ear valves and valves in their nose that close to keep water out while underwater or swimming.

Diet: Beavers eat leaves, inner bark, and twigs as well as some grasses and aquatic plants.

Misc facts:

Teeth are reinforced with iron which gives them an orange appearance.

Can stay underwater for up to 15 minutes due to large lung capacity.

Can swim up to six miles per hour.

Tail shape varies between beaver families from short and stubby to long and narrow.

Build lodges that can only be accessed from underwater entrances.
